
MARGISTAR Launches First Country Focus with Italian Consortium Members





Our first annual COST Action meeting took place in Inari and Utsjoki, Finland, this May and gave MARGISTAR members a chance to meet face-to-face and learn about the periphery challenges facing local municipalities and the indigenous Sámi people.
